GHS Undergoing Major Renovations and Construction

When you were a sophomore at GHS—or since Grimsley became a four-year school again in more recent years, when you were a freshman—did you ever fall for the old gag of buying an elevator pass from an upperclassman for the non-existent elevator in the Main Building? (No? Well, neither did I.) And did you ever sweat through not only test but also daily classes in late August and September because most of the buildings on campus weren't air conditioned?



(Well, of course you did, as did we all!) In case you haven't heard, that elevator—in fact, three of them on campus total—as well as air conditioning for all the classroom buildings at our alma mater, will soon be installed as part of a \$12.2 million project of major capital improvements that is currently underway at GHS.

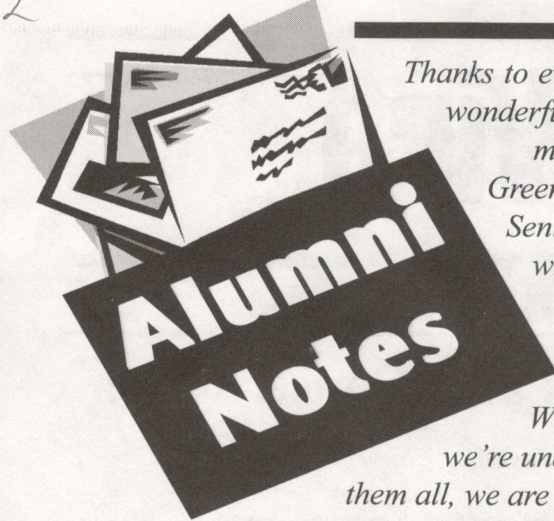
The project includes adding architecturally compatible extensions at each end of the Main Building which will house elevators and accessible restrooms. Most of the familiar wooden covered walkways which connect the various buildings are being replaced with two-storied ones built of brick, with open facades of arches on both sides and covered walkways on the second level as well, allowing wheelchair access to

the second floors of the Old Science, Home Ec, Music, and Vocational buildings. These new covered walkways are in essence those designed for GHS's original 1929 construction by architect Charles Hartmann—save for the roof over the upper level—and which were to have been known as “cloisters,” but which had to be dropped at that time (along with three buildings, actually) because of funding problems. Remember the second-story doors at each end of the Main Building and at the North end of the Old Science building? Though recently (in 1999) closed up because of safety reasons, they will be reopened for access to the upper-level walkway, and new second-story entrances into the Home Ec, Music, and Vocational buildings are being created as well. The Cafeteria building is having an elevator-and-accessible-restrooms tower added at its south end, the Library (“Media Center”)—housed since moving in 1967 into its own separate building built between the auditorium and the Home Ec Building, directly behind the Main Building (it's previous home)—is being significantly enlarged, including the addition of two high-tech classrooms. Besides air conditioning, modern cables and wiring are being installed throughout the school to allow for the utilization of up-to-date technology.

Lost Loved Ones

Dorothy McNairy '24 began her teaching career in her alma mater's math department in 1927 only three years after graduating from Greensboro High School and continued at GHS until 1934, when she was laid off because of budget cuts caused by the Depression. She taught at High Point Central for the next three years before returning to Grimsley Senior High School in 1937, where Miss McNairy remained on the faculty until 1956, at which time she became the first principal of General Greene Elementary School, a post she held for 15 years. While a student at GHS, Miss McNairy participated in the Girls' Athletic Association and, while on the faculty, she served for many years as the advisor to the Student Council. Miss McNairy's sister Mary McNairy '19 taught history at GHS for a number of years as well, passing away while on the faculty in 1937.

Herbert W. Smith '46 a veteran of the US Army and retired from Blue Bell, Inc. died June 28, 2001. He was a charter member of Jamestown Presbyterian Church, life member of the Greensboro Elks Lodge 602 and a 32nd Degree Mason. He was a Shriner of the Oasis Temple and was an active member of the Oriental Shrine Club. He was an active member of the Four Seasons Civitan Club and the Fiesta Dance Club. Mr. Smith was the loving husband of Dollie M. Smith, devoted father of Gayle Smith Neely, proud father-in-law of Charles L. Neely, and grandfather to Ranger. Also survived by brothers J. Harold Smith and C. Herman Smith; and sister, Carolyn Smith Garrison, all of Greensboro.

Pat Addison '54 instructed on the elementary level for several years before returning to GHS where she taught physical education and coached between 1966 and 1988. She coached basketball and volleyball and advised the Girls' Athletic Association. While a student at Greensboro Senior High School, Miss

Addison was a member of Torchlight and participated in the band, orchestra, FTA, and softball.

Alan L. Pultz '55, Emmy Award winning director of the soap opera General Hospital, died October 25, 2001 at his home in Encino, California. Services were held in Lebanon, Connecticut on October 30, 2001. Mr. Pultz was born in New York, NY, on July 11, 1937. He moved to Greensboro with his family in 1946 and graduated from Greensboro Senior High in 1955. He earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Radio, Television and Motion Pictures from the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill in 1959 and was a member of Chi Psi Fraternity. After serving two years in the United States Navy, he went to work for ABC Television in New York. He moved to Los Angeles in 1972 and directed General Hospital from 1978 until his retirement in 1999. Mr. Pultz won three Emmy Awards for directing General Hospital and was most proud of winning the Directors' Guild of America award for Outstanding Directorial Achievement in 1995. He is survived by his wife, Reiko Pultz of Encino, California, his brother David Pultz (GHS class of 1965) of Winston-Salem and his sister, Linda Pultz Dennis (GHS class of 1958) of Springfield, Virginia.

Dorothy Nell Parker was an English teacher at GHS from 1959 until 1971. She assisted in the Dean's Office for several years and was faculty advisor to the Charioteers service club. Both she and Mrs. Bleakley were transferred to Dudley Senior High School in 1971 where they finished their teaching careers.

June D. Bleakley served as Grimsley's assistant librarian from 1964 to 1971, during which time (1967) the library was moved from the second floor of the Main Building to its own separate building.

JAMIESON STADIUM UPDATE

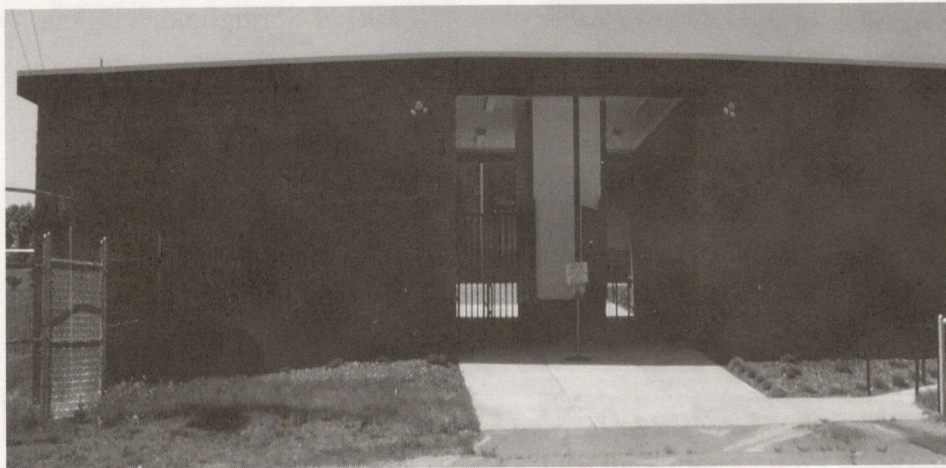

I submit for your information and consideration the following costs incurred by the Jamieson Stadium Trust from November 1988 to the above date and pertaining to all costs incurred in the renovation project. Please bear in mind that I have not attempted to identify all sources of receipts, nor do we account for substantial additional costs incurred and met by Concession profits, such as fixtures, appliances, upfitting costs of the concession operation, field and lawn maintenance, field machinery and equipment purchases for the Athletic Department, and like expenses. The following is a restatement of costs paid only by the Trust itself.

You are probably aware of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), passed by Congress in the early 1900's, and which includes a section requiring equal access in existing public facilities for those with disabilities. When Greensboro Senior High School was originally built on Westover Terrace in 1929, as well as when additional buildings on the campus were added over the years (with the exception of the New Science Building, completed in 1975), accessibility issues were not on the front burner, if at all.

When I attended GHS in the early 1970's, students in wheelchairs and those who had other accessibility needs were assigned to Page Senior High School, which despite having been built in the late 1950's was always basically barrier free. GHS — with its many individual buildings, most of which are two stories (with the Main Building of course being three) — has never been very "friendly" for those who use wheelchairs. Anybody who had ever tried to figure out how to make Grimsley more accessible pretty much gave up, considering the immense practical issues that would have to be overcome as well as the fact that funds — limited and unlimited — were never really part of the equation.

Then in 2000, voters in Guilford County approved a \$200 million bond package for the Guilford County Schools, not only for bringing all schools into ADA compliance, but also for bringing Guilford's schools into the 21st century relative to technology, and specifically for air conditioning schools like Grimsley that just basically did not have it. Grimsley's \$12.2 million share of the total amount, while sounding like a big chunk of change, is actually having to be spread incredibly thin as the school's needs were considered within the framework of enhancing and not damaging the beautiful and in many ways unique campus. And this is where we can all breathe a sigh of relief as a number of individuals have gone and are going the extra

mile to see that GHS receives the careful treatment it deserves during this project.

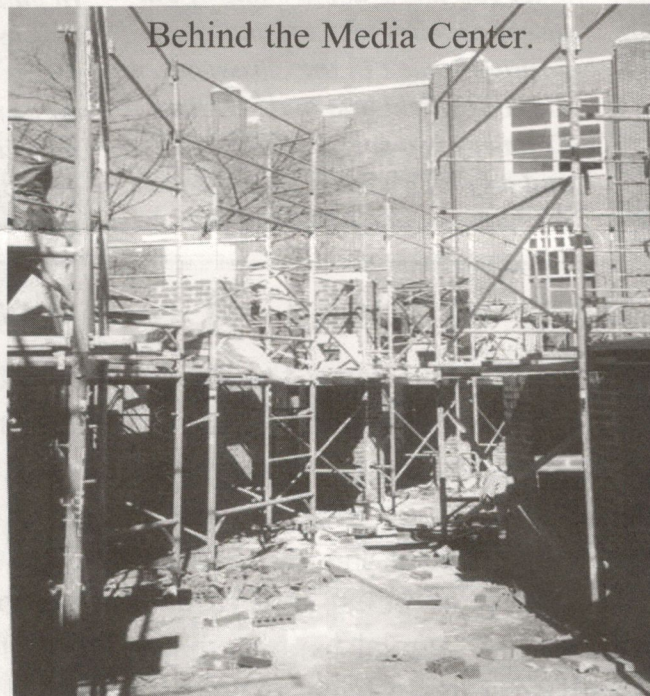
No one can argue the fact that GHS's beauty has always been and continues to be one of its greatest assets. The wooded campus, the multiple buildings arranged in a visually pleasing layout, the expansive front lawn, and the wooden covered walkways — some daring back to the 1930's — connecting the various buildings, all figure in anyone's description of Grimsley. In light of this, making the needed changes at GHS in a pleasing yet practical (read "cheap") way was the challenge faced by the Charlotte office of the national architectural firm of Schenkel and Schultz.

Project architect Russ Nicholson was struck by the historic beauty of the school and has worked with his team to make sure that their designs — particularly those that would affect the Westover Terrace façade — were done with the utmost care.

When projected costs in the planning stages were thought to be significantly over what the bond money would allow, Grimsley's current principal, Mrs. Jane Teague, mindful of what was at stake, kept a very calm head and insisted that things could and would be worked out in an acceptable way, which of course happened. Make no mistake about it, Mrs.

Teague's watchful eye has been critical so far to the success in the current project every step of the way.

Representing Mrs. Teague in an *ad hoc* fashion throughout the entire process has been my GHS historical colleague Harry Bradley '77, who with his undergraduate degree in architecture and graduate work in an architectural history, his working for a number of years at Colonial Williamsburg, and topped off by his love of Grimsley has given him a unique role in this whole process. From the beginning of the project Garry attended meetings with the architects, advised them about GHS's architectural history, and offered advice



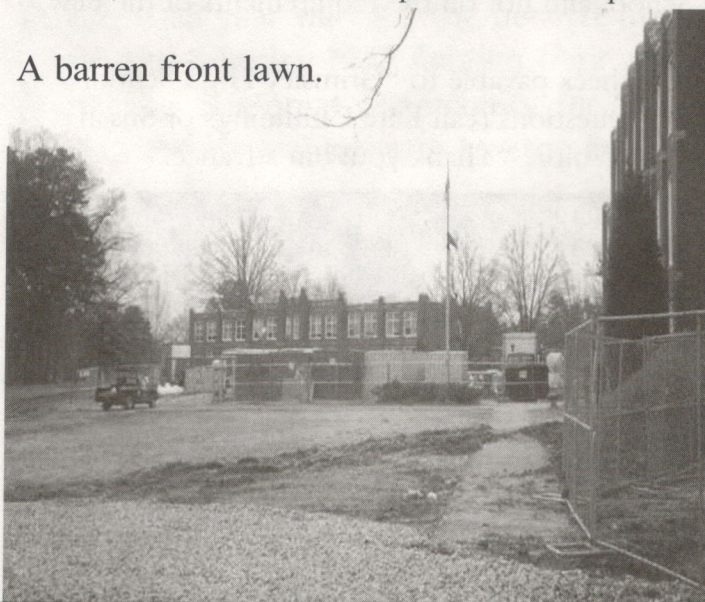
and commentary on various aspects of the design, especially regarding historical appearance. In addition, he has helped with the selection of appropriate brick for the outside of building and the new covered walkways as well as tile selection for floors and even paint colors. Harry's efforts here on behalf of us all are inestimable.

And finally, the John S. Clark Construction Company's project manager, responsible for all aspects of the actual entire construction project, is Michael Schott '68. Michael has been going the extra mile to make sure that the small details are being done right. How fortunate to have an alumnus in charge of the hands-on work.

Work at Grimsley began last summer before school started. Plywood tunnels were constructed, enclosing the sidewalks from the Main Building to the Old Science Building, allowing for construction on the new covered walkways to move forward while current students — who still must use those sidewalks to get to class — are able to do so. The school's front lawn has taken on the appearance of a typical construction site, covered with trailers, construction equipment, and supplied, all enclosed by a chain-link fence.

The upcoming spring break will find the project in still higher gear, as the empty campus will allow for the removal of the old heating system (including replacement of all original radiators), for the electrical service being switched over to new circuits, and for the second-story decking the new covered walkways that are presently under construction to be hoisted into place. This summer will also find a flurry of activity as the walkway project continues and the library is basically packed up and stored so that the current structure can be gutted and the addition presently under construction can be completed. The entire GHS project is currently ahead of schedule, and those involved hope it will be completed

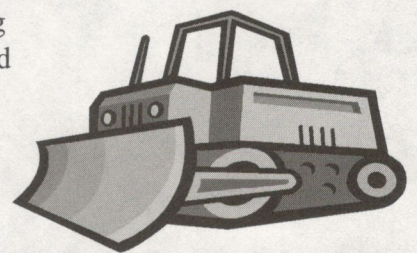
A barren front lawn.

this August, before the start of the new school year. Fortunately, plenty of time was tacked on to the end to allow the working out of any problems that might appear after the main construction and renovation work is completed, as well as for relandscaping affected areas of the grounds.

While I don't know of anyone who was excited about losing the distinctive wooden covered walkways, the cost of adding elevators to each of the multiple-storied buildings on campus would have been staggering and thus prohibitive. The fact that the current dilemma could be addressed in an historical way by looking to the original architect's plans from the 1920's seems quite extraordinary, that's for sure. And will anyone complain about future students getting to avoid excessively hot classrooms in the late summer or the sound of banging radiator pipes in the winter? Probably not. We all are holding our breaths relative to how the extension of the Main Building will ultimately affect its proportion and scale. On that one the jury is still out. But given the complexity of the GHS project, I think that we are enormously fortunate that a number of dedicated and caring individuals have worked tirelessly within the given limits of the project to ensure that the end results will be positive.

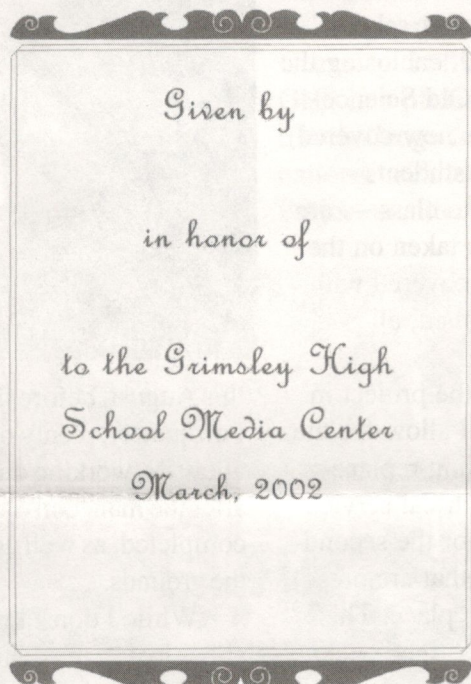

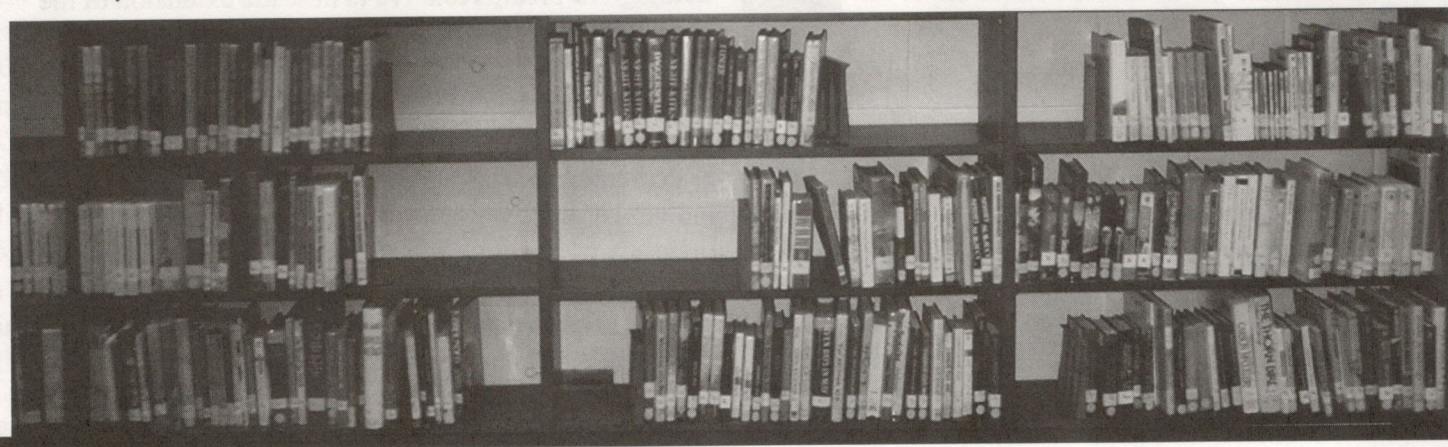

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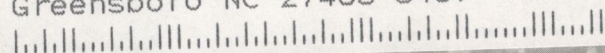
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
