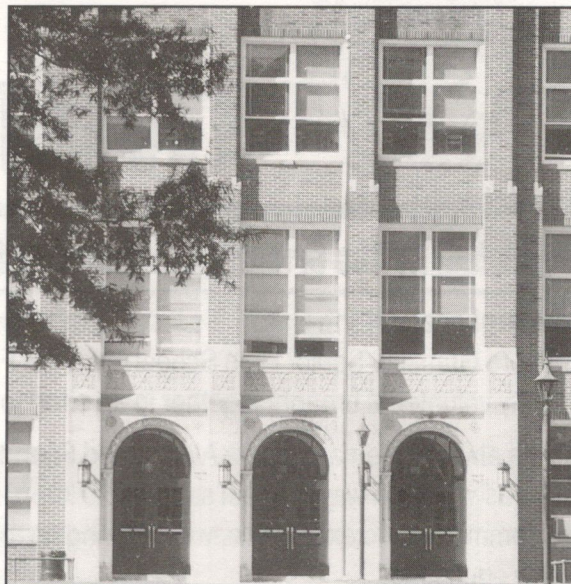
Alumni Directory Info.

GHS Fast Facts

Following are some interesting tidbits for your enjoyment.....

Greensboro High School was established in 1899 and was located on Forbis Street behind what is now the Greensboro Historical Museum.

The School's first athletic team was established in 1905 -- football.

Originally called the "Purple Whirlwinds" because of the school's purple & gold colors, the GHS nickname became the "Whirlies" in 1951 when, after a heavy rain ruined the purple band uniforms, students voted to change the colors to the more colorfast blue & white.

In 1910, Greensboro High School moved to Spring Street (the current location of the Philip J. Weaver Education Center) and in 1929 opened its doors on Westover Terrace.

In response to the opening of Page Senior High School to the Greensboro School System, Greensboro Senior High School changed its name to "Grimsley" Senior High School on July 1, 1962. It was named after Superintendent George A. Grimsley who led the way to establishing the school in 1899.

Jamieson Stadium was named for Coach Bob Jamieson at his retirement in 1975. During 42 years on the GHS faculty, he coached 19 state championship teams in four sports --football, basketball, golf and women's swimming.

The Greensboro Youth Council (GYC) began sponsoring the High IQ Bowl in 1965, of which GHS produced championship teams in 1971, '80, '82, '83, '87, '88, '89, '90, '92 and '96.

Why is my donation needed?

Imagine this....

It's a cool, crisp fall evening. You walk through the gate, handing your ticket to Mrs. Sawyer (as you've done for the past 20 years). You find your place on the cool aluminum bleacher, being sure to pull out your trusty ol' stadium blanket for the night's event. When, lo, the beat of the drum corps begins from behind the school. As the crowd grows and the sound nears the stadium, cheers begin to echo. The victory bell is rolled in. The team exits the field house, waiting for the band to make its tunnel formation for the grand entrance. Ah, the feeling, the excitement, the tradition, the.... sweatshirts and jeans?music stands held to instruments by masking tape? What happened to the shiny brass pieces? the deep blue and white band uniforms? the drum majors in their crisp white uniforms that for so long have been representing our prideful GHS? What's going on?

A need for more funding, that's what. Over the years, items which are not paid for by tax dollars must be replaced only on a dire need basis. But it is these items which help define GHS as the "excellent" institution we have come to know and love.

Can you imagine going to the Auditorium to hear the speeches for Student Body Officers, and listening to the candidates shout from the stage because the sound system is so antiquated that the acoustics carry better without the use of a microphone? Or watching the band march in sweats? Or rehabilitating a sports injury on weight room equipment that's been around since the '60s?

These things are happening today, and they need our serious attention. There are NO uniforms for the 110 band members, the largest ever at GHS. The weight

room benches which are used by gym classes as well as athletes are rickety and dangerous. Computer equipment changes so rapidly it is difficult for schools to keep up with technology, yet it is vital that students entering today's workforce be proficient in the most upgraded software available.

So many of these items . . . from auditorium restorations to football pads . . . are purchased with money raised by students and school volunteers. They are funded by events such as ticket and concession sales or candy and wrapping paper drives. Many of our programs would have a difficult time being successful were it not for the generosity of individuals in our community. For instance, one family sponsors a fund to provide financial assistance for Madrigal performers who could not otherwise afford to attend out-of-town performances. And the PTA is even sponsoring *Applause 1999*, a casino night and silent auction raffle in the gym February 8, 1997 at 7:30pm to help raise money for the auditorium restoration.

But these efforts just aren't enough! GHS deserves our help.

Greensboro Grimsley Senior High School is the first public school in the Guilford County System to form an organization beyond the PTA and Booster Club in order to enrich the lives of its students, alumni and friends. Annual memberships and additional tax deductible donations will fund the immediate projects slotted for the school, while endowments can be set up to fund long-term foundation goals.

Please join today! Let's give something back to Greensboro Grimsley Senior High School so that future Whirlies have the same chance -- the same opportunity -- to create their own history of excellence.

Academic Excellence In a New Generation

Excellence in academics has always been part of the enviable and proud reputation of Greensboro Grimsley Senior High School. And though long gone are the days of slide rules and reel-to-reel movies, the bar has been raised to new levels of expectation as each generation has achieved higher and higher goals.

IB Status Achieved

The most recent honor bestowed upon Greensboro Grimsley Senior High School is recognition as an International Baccalaureate Organization school. This IB status offers students the opportunity to take advanced classes in subjects ranging from Japanese to Philosophy and receive college credit (similar to the familiar AP system) and international recognition for their studies.

GHS and High Point Central were the first schools in the Guilford County School System to be considered for IB Status. IB educators interviewed the faculty, investigated the campus and trained the teachers to ensure that the standards set for this program would be met. Due to the teachings of Dr. Christopher Frost, GHS is the first school in North America and only the third in the World to offer IB Classical Greek as an elective course in the program.

In addition to dedicated classroom time (some classes are even taught via computer modem from schools across the country), many of these students write a 3,000-word research paper and complete 150 hours in "creative, action and service events." These activities include attending art exhibits, participating in sporting events and community

service projects.

In the 1995-96 school year, more than 200 students took at least one IB class and eleven GHS seniors are currently on their way to completing the requirements for International Baccalaureate status on their diplomas.

"The '95-96 academic year was a banner year for the IB program at Grimsley. In addition to the fact that it was our inaugural year as an IB school, many of our students performed with distinction in both their course work and exit examinations. Our Advanced Classical Greek class, in fact, turned out to be the only group in the world to sit for this particular examination, and their aggregate score of five (seven constituting a perfect score) is highly commendable. Congratulations to them."

The Computer Age

Computers have become commonplace in the lives of most GHS students today, and the classroom is no different. There are Business-Learning Labs which enable students and teachers from different schools to share resources. For example, GHS receives Japanese instruction on the computer for its IB program. In 1995-96, students were even able to take an "Electronic Field Trip" to interview immigrants on Staten Island via live feed access through CNN's web site.

The "Future Center Room," manned by parent volunteers, is available with six on-line computers for students to conduct research, college and career searches, and even complete job applications. As well, GHS teachers receive ongoing computer training and have laptop computers available for them to check-out on a daily basis.

Apprenticeship Programs

The Guilford County School System and the Greensboro Chamber of Commerce have developed a workforce readiness program for kids with no plans to attend a 4-year college. These apprenticeships place students in a work environment, giving them experience and an opportunity for employment right after graduation. Oftentimes, funding for technical school or college is available for students who later choose to further their education within the chosen career path.

For the 1996-97 school year, there are three students who have been selected for metalworking apprenticeships. An electrical trades program is also currently underway. Examples of the companies currently involved in the apprenticeship program include American Express and Ciba.

Heads & Shoulders Above the Rest

Greensboro Grimsley Senior High School has always performed well academically compared to other High Schools throughout our state. And the '95-'96 school year was no different. Grimsley students who took the SAT last year scored 9% higher overall compared to the Guilford County School System average and 10% higher than the average for North Carolina.

Athletic Achievements A+

Ever since the organization of its first athletic team, football, in 1905, the Greensboro Grimsley Senior High School athletes have given A+ performances both on and off the playing field.

As early as 1907, the school earned its first state championship title and went on to win 95 more over the course of 89 years. These achievements span twenty sports in both men's and women's events.

Coach Bob Jamieson, on the GHS faculty from 1933-1975, and Coach Bob Sawyer, a faculty member since 1961 and Athletic Director to date, have been the only ones to oversee the athletic program at Greensboro Grimsley Senior High School. The work ethic and morality these two men inspired in their athletes are the cornerstone for the success of the school's program for those 63 years. During this time, the athletic program has not only continued to thrive but has expanded to 238 young men and 246 young women who competed on 21 different varsity teams, supported by 10 Junior Varsity teams, during the '95-'96 school year.

Since its establishment in 1980, the Wachovia Cup has been the highest athletic honor that can be awarded to any high school in North Carolina. Awarded in each of the four athletic classes, GHS holds the title for the best overall athletic record in the state in 1985, '86, '87, '88 and 1990.

The current student athletes are no different. They are living up to the legacy of excellence established by that first football team in 1905. The graduating class of 1996 boasted two more state championship teams. The men's tennis team won their title with a 9-0 victory over Raleigh Broughton. Meanwhile, appearing in their fifth straight title match, the women's soccer team won its 4th championship in the last five years. They were also honored with a 3rd place National ranking. Among other athletic accomplishments were conference championships in women's tennis, swimming and soccer and men's baseball, tennis and soccer.

In the classroom, their achievements were equally as impressive. GHS student

athletes excelled in the classroom with 12 teams receiving the NCHS Athletic Association's Scholar/Athlete Program Award for maintaining a 3.1 team average during their season. A total of 148 Grimsley varsity athletes were honored for earning GPAs of 3.5 and higher.

With the continued support of the fellow students, parents, teachers, coaches and GHS alumni, that same tradition of excellence should continue for many years to come. Our stadium complex has the potential to be one of the finest in the state, thanks to the incredible efforts of the Jamieson Stadium fund. However, that project remains unfinished and the cost of yearly maintenance continues to increase. The Booster Club plays a crucial role in fund raising, but few people realize that the needs for equipment, uniforms, stadium costs and so much more are funded solely by those ticket sales, concessions and countless hours of volunteer work.

Through the success of the Greensboro Grimsley Senior High School Alumni & Friends Association, many of these projects can be completed and thrive. But the student athletes at GHS need, and deserve, our help. Please make sure that the student athletes of tomorrow have the same opportunities to become the next San Diego Charger like Reuben Davis ('83) or a Buffalo Bills teammate like Ethan Albright ('89).

Meet Grimsley's Newest Principal



Following a long and distinguished list of leaders, Grimsley's newest Principal is experienced, involved and female. Principal Jane Teague has

an extensive background in education and says that being at Greensboro Grimsley Senior High School is "like coming home again."

Principal Teague spent her school-aged years moving between her Greensboro home and her family's farm in rural Alamance County. She then earned an undergraduate degree and a Masters in Administration from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. She has completed all but her dissertation toward a Doctoral degree, but says that she is enjoying her experience as a High School Principal too much to sacrifice that time to finish it.

With fourteen years of classroom teaching in grades 7 through 12, Principal Teague says she strives to work hard to administer to the needs of both her students and her teachers. She spent a few years in

Personnel at the Central Office as well as time serving as Principal of both Elementary and Middle schools. But it wasn't until her arrival at Eastern Guilford High School three years ago that she said she felt a true "revival of spirit." She was thrilled about being back in a High School setting.

Her first-hand experience as an educator as well as an administrator gives her a real advantage in tackling the challenges of a school the size of Grimsley. In fact, that was her first impression when she arrived at GHS -- the size -- the amount and variety of students and teachers she faced -- and the sheer "presence" of the school. Although it will take her some time to learn the near 1,500 students' names, her goal is for Greensboro Grimsley Senior High School to be a better place for having her there.

Principal Teague takes a genuine interest and gets involved in all aspects of the school's activities. From attending the Girls' Volleyball match to working with the new Alumni & Friends Association, she wants to be an integral part of life at GHS.

"High School years are a time for exploration," says Principal Teague. And she wants to do all she can to

encourage young people to explore all opportunities in preparing for both college and a career path while still in High School. She believes it is vital to a student's success in the real world that they become interested early in life in *something* that will bring them a brighter future.

With the emergence of the Greensboro Grimsley Senior High School Alumni & Friends Association, Principal Teague hopes to see not only the addition of vital resources, but also an opportunity for students to dialog with community leaders and volunteers. She wants to give these kids "the chance to see and hear the pride that (GHS) Alumni have" and to gain an appreciation that this school is loved so much by so many.

Needless to say, Principal Jane Teague is a great asset to a great school. She says she is "honored to be here" and is looking forward to being a part of creating a new Whirlie history. Taking on a new school -- especially one the size of Grimsley -- is a big responsibility and extremely time consuming. So, does Principal Teague have any free time for herself? "Once a week I go and hold my grandson," she says. "That's my luxury."
