

Letter from the President,


I had the pleasure recently of attending the Underclass Awards Assembly at Grimsley. Scheduled a few days earlier than the Senior Awards Ceremony, it recognizes overall academic excellence as well as special honors in the different areas of study. In her opening remarks, Grimsley's principal, Jane Teague, noted that few schools still celebrate an event like this because of problems with student interest and attention at such a lengthy ceremony in which each student is recognized individually for their accomplishments. Then she remarked that this tradition continues very successfully at this school, because "that's the way we do things at Grimsley." I then spent the next couple of hours in awe of the behavior of these young people, their respect and sincere appreciation for their fellow students. From the greatest of accomplishments to the smallest of awards, the responses were genuine and enthusiastic. The musical interludes performed by some truly gifted students included a cello and violin duet, a solo vocalist, and a jazz ensemble. Each of these was outstanding and received in the same attentive and appreciative manner. At the end of the program, two young men received special recognition for their courage in dealing with great personal challenges during the past school year. This honor ignited a prolonged and thunderous standing ovation that touched the hearts of everyone in attendance. The emotional response of the audience was surpassed only by the pride on the faces and the joy in the eyes of those two young men. It was a very special moment; it was "the way they do things at Grimsley."

At our last Alumni board meeting John Atkinson and Marc Bush shared with us their experiences during the last couple years of interviewing the student scholarship applicants. They described certain themes that were amazingly common to almost all the applicants when they were asked to describe their experiences at Grimsley. First they spoke of the tremendous diversity, not just cultural, racial, socioeconomic, and religious, but also in the myriad of opportunities available and the rich variety of talent in the student body. They noted the band, the Madrigal singers, the many accomplished athletic teams, the Science Olympiad team, and countless other examples of excellence. They were especially proud of the respect and admiration the students accorded each and every one of their gifted classmates at Grimsley. They felt honored to be part of this "Statue of Liberty school" as Mrs. Teague

often describes it. A school blessed with so many opportunities, a school where hundreds of students find ways to transfer in from other districts each year and hundreds more are turned away disappointed. Another theme was that of the excellent teachers at Grimsley. They noted their knowledge and expertise, the care and time they invested in their students, and the respect the students and teachers shared for each other. The final recurring theme related to the leadership at Grimsley, specifically their principal, Jane Teague. They described her as both tough and caring, someone who treated them fairly and with respect and dignity, who truly believed in them, who expected and demanded their best effort and behavior because "that's the way we do things at Grimsley."

Later that same week I had the privilege of presenting the Alumni Association's student scholarships at the Senior Awards Ceremony. This was another grand display of talent and effort, with over \$5.2 million of scholarships earned by the Class of 2001. Again I was touched by the way these students honored each of their classmates, the reverence shown and the sincere joy they seemed to share in each other's success. One special four-year full scholarship that was anonymously donated and channeled through the Alumni Association, honored an outstanding young lady who had overcome many obstacles and great personal sacrifice to succeed in school and in life. Again a spontaneous and very emotional standing ovation greeted this truly deserving student. Each new class at Grimsley High School is not only offered the opportunity for a great education, but also the chance to share these experiences, to be molded by the traditions of excellence, of respect and tolerance of valuing the unique gifts in all their fellow students. Upperclassmen serve as role models, teachers, and guides to the younger students. These young men and women are thus "descendants" of all the past graduates of Grimsley, part of the legacy, the traditions again being passed on. As alumni, all of you have touched the lives of these young people. This is why we volunteer for this organization, why we ask for your generous financial support, why we fight so hard to meet the needs and protect this school, because of "the way they do things at Grimsley."

Jamieson Stadium Update

As many of you know, our initial phase of the Robert B. Jamieson Stadium renovation has been completed. While much remains to be done, a significant portion was started in April 2001, calling for construction of restrooms and ticket facilities on the east (home side) of the complex.

With \$157,000 on hand, we finalized a contract with Dennis and Sharpe Construction to complete the home-side phase. Upon letting the contract for topography, we found substantial changes pertaining to code requirements for handicapped persons. Our plans were modifed to meet these requirements. Upon applying for permits to the City, it was

determined that a new water line would be required for inspections department standards and that major repair to the 50-year-old sewer lines were necessary.

To date, the outside perimeters of the two restroom buildings are up and plumbing roughed in, waiting for the water line to be brought in. The ticket facility foundation is in and soon the entire project will be under roof. Our target for completion is August 2001.

The unanticipated requirements of the health and inspection departments of the County and City required significant changes in our architect's plans and, of course, in the cost of the project. We anticipated a budget shortfall of about \$35,000.

Even with on-going concession revenues, a modest part earmarked for stadium renovation, we ask for help from the Alumni. Please join with us to see this project completed by sending your tax deductible contribution (large or small) to:



culty walking into the ball-room on Firday night because of the huge turnout. What a thrill!


On Saturday, we gathered at the school to enjoy a picnic lunch

MEMORABILIA NEEDED ...

Tucked away in a small room in the Music Building is one of GHS's lesser known features - our School Archives. This room serves as a repository for documents and artifacts that are significant to the history of Greensboro Grimsley Senior High School.

The Archives had a rather humble beginning. Miss Mildred Herring, Librarian from 1944 to 1972, collected and saved copies of many school publications and a few other miscellaneous documents. They were safely housed in one small cabinet in the Library workroom. Around 1979, permission was given to move the entire contents to the larger quarters of Room 100 on the first floor of the Main Building. By the mid 1980s Room 100 was needed for other purposes and the Archives was relegated to the basement. Knowing this location was completely unsuitable, space was obtained a few months later in the Music Building to house the growing collection. The Archives remains there to this day. Two weeks after the move, a water main broke and flooded the basement with three feet of water which would have destroyed everything!

We are looking for donations of any memorabilia you may no longer want. Especially important is anything that dates from 1899 to 1950. Such items include copies of "High Life', "The Reflector", "Homespun", Graduation programs and programs for any other school event, newspaper clippings from "The Greensboro Daily News" and "The Greensboro Record", student handbooks, uniforms, photographs and scrapbooks. Such items from more recent years are welcome including videos. We have plenty of copies of the "Whirligig" but we could use a couple from 1952.
