North Carolina Teacher of the Year — KARYN DICKERSON

Marta Force: Prior to accepting a teaching position at Grimsley, what had you heard or learned about Grimsley and from what perspective?

Karyn Dickerson: I grew up in Rockingham County and took my SATs at Grimsley High School. I remember being impressed by the size of the campus and the beauty of the older buildings. I had always heard that Grimsley had a reputation of academic excellence, so I was excited when I was offered a teaching position here.

MF: What made you want to interview for a position at Grimsley High School?

KD: When I decided to enter the teaching profession as a lateral entry teacher, I wanted to expedite the process and started calling high schools in Guilford County. Grimsley was one of the first schools I called. When I called Grimsley, I was informed that an English teacher had just left that day. I drove from Rockingham County to Grimsley High School with my résumé and teaching philosophy. I was interviewed on the spot, my references were called, and I was offered the job within twenty-four hours. I guess you could say it was destiny!

MF: Now that you have been teaching at Grimsley for a while, has your perspective of the school changed, and if so, in what way (s)?

KD: My perspective of Grimsley has changed. I initially thought of Grimsley as primarily a school of academic excellence, but when I started teaching, I learned very quickly that the school is much more diverse than many people in Guilford County realize. I love our diversity—the diversity of our students, the diversity of the communities we serve, and the diversity of the staff—all of these unique cultures swirl together and combine to create the beautiful, powerful Whirlie that represents our school. Compared to other teaching positions . . . Grimsley is my first full-time teaching assignment.

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Greensboro Auditorium Renovation Update

Bids to remove the plywood overlay and to repair the original stage floor back to its original construction have been received and approved by the Board. Bids for conversion of a portion of the lighting system to a LED system have been received and will be acted on by the board once the specifications are approved by the school system. Replacement of the black back curtains is also on our wish list




for replacement this summer.



Gift of Harry Bradley to Grimsley Senior High School of a Mural Painted by James Augustus McLean

Here at Grimsley, we have enjoyed the legacy of having two murals painted by noted North Carolina artist James Augustus McLean, and which have hung in our Auditorium since 1934. This year, 2014, marks the 80th anniversary of the installation of the murals *Energy* and *Education*. To commemorate the anniversary, a third mural painted later in life by McLean has been obtained and presented as a gift to G.H.S. by Harry Bradley of the Class of 1977.

The new mural is titled *Croatoan Tree* and was painted sometime prior to 1979. It will hang in the lobby of the new Byrd – Bradley Cafeteria Building. To especially accompany the mural, Mr. McLean also wrote a poem titled *A Very Special Tree*. Together, they commemorated the 400th anniversary of the events surrounding the arrival of, and ultimately unknown fate of, the Lost Colony on Roanoke Island. The only clue ever discovered about the Lost Colony was a single word carved into a tree: "CROATOAN." This mural is McLean's idealized version of that tree.

JAMES AUGUSTUS McLEAN

James Augustus McLean (May 2, 1904 - March 29, 1989) was born in Lincolnton, North Carolina, the seventh and youngest child of John Thomas McLean and Lillian Lee Haynes McLean. Educated in the public schools, he graduated from Lincolnton High School in 1922, and then attended the University of North Carolina for one year. In 1924 McLean applied to and was accepted for enrollment at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts Country School in Chester Springs, Pennsylvania. While there, McLean studied under noted artists Daniel Garber, Charles Garner, and Joseph Pearson. In 1928 he earned one of the prestigious Cresson Traveling Scholarships, which provided for four months of travel to England, the Netherlands, Belgium, France, Switzerland, Italy, Tunisia, Algeria, and Spain. In 1929, he won Honorable Mention for the Topan Prize at the Academy.

During his final year at the Pennsylvania Academy, McLean met with a visiting delegation of the North Carolina State Art Society, led by High Point native John J. Blair. They asked McLean to consider returning to his home state in order to help establish a school specializing in the teaching of art. In the spring of 1929, McLean moved to Raleigh, and that fall the Southern School of Creative Arts opened with McLean as its only instructor. Among several staff members he hired was Carrie Ann Simpson, a dance teacher who he soon married. They had four children.

With the crash of the stock market in October of 1929, and the onset of the Great Depression, high unemployment resulted. Significantly, the Southern School did remain open during this period but did not bring in much income. During the administration of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, many Federal relief programs were created to assist people who were out of work or severely underemployed. One of the direct beneficiaries of these programs was James McLean. By January of 1934, funding from two of the programs, the Federal Emergency Relief Administration (FERA) and the Civil Works Administration (CWA), became available to the Greensboro City Schools to be used for improvement projects. One of the projects chosen was to completely paint and decorate, for the first time, the auditorium of Greensboro Senior High School. The decorating plan included two, independently painted

murals, to be located on either side of the stage. By October of 1934, the auditorium painting had been completed, and James McLean's murals *Energy* and *Education* installed.

Other murals by McLean from the 1930's were a series of four panels depicting Engineering, Agriculture, Architecture, and Science for the D. H. Hill Library at North Carolina State College of Agriculture and Engineering (now NCSU) in 1934-35 and a large, single mural depicting the history of Cabarrus County for the Charles Cannon Memorial Library in Concord in 1942.

In 1944-45, during World War II, McLean undertook another government-funded art project, painting 27 illustrations for a brochure for the United States Public Health Service and the North Carolina State Board of Health. In 1945, McLean and his family moved to San Fernando, California for four years. His wife pursued a Hollywood dance career while McLean continued to paint, including large-scale mural work.

Upon his return to Raleigh in 1949, and until his death in 1989, McLean continued to produce art at a prolific pace. Through most of the 1950's, he and his wife opened, operated, and taught at the United Arts Institute, after which he became head of the Art Department and staff artist at the Raleigh office of WUNC-TV until his retirement in 1970. During these later years, he produced several non-commissioned murals, notably *Croatoan Tree, The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse*, a series on the history of the American Indian, and a large mural of *Indians Presenting Tobacco to the First English Colony*. Several commissioned murals were also painted in this time period by McLean, of which little is known.

Throughout his long career, James McLean experimented with many styles and media, producing primarily portraits, landscapes, and abstract works in oil, water color, pencil, charcoal, tempera, and ink. Sculptures, mostly of human figures, were created in plaster, many species of wood, and a wide variety of stone. The driving force of McLean's career was a life-long passion to create art, and to bring art and art education to his home state of North Carolina.



The Whirlies had a busy 2013-14 and some very successful performances that bode well for a bright future. During the fall season, new Football Coach Pat Neal, took a young team, with only two seniors, to the State Playoffs. Our Men's Cross Country Team placed third in the conference and the Women's Team won the conference title, with Tori Churchill named the Conference Runner of the Year. GHS Men's Soccer Team won the conference title and Senior Ben Lucas was selected to play in the East-West All-Star Game this summer. The Volleyball Team was second in the conference and Grimsley's Women's Field Hockey Team competed for the first time in history this year.

During the winter season, both GHS Women's and Men's Basketball Teams may not have had the win-loss records they were hoping for, but they competed fiercely in each and every game. In Swimming, the Women's Team was named Regional Champions, while the men placed third. At the State Meet, the women were fifth and the men were seventh. GHS Orchestra News

Britany Green Stimpson became the conductor of the Grimsley and Kiser Orchestras in the 2001-2002 school year. Fresh out of UNCG's music education program at the time, she is a New York native who took to North Carolina, and Greensboro in particular, with enthusiasm and joy. A strong advocate of the value of music education for every child, Britany has worked to keep the orchestra programs strong and to encourage students to participate who range from those brand new to a stringed instrument to those who come to her already quite accomplished from private lessons. She has done an excellent job in her 14 years on the job and is much beloved by the students and their parents who have passed through her programs.

During Ms. Green's tenure at Grimsley, the orchestra revived the policy of taking overnight trips, but with a special twist: Ms. Green is much less interested in traveling for music festivals, Disney parades, and Caribbean cruises than in trips that contribute to the goal of well-rounded music education. So her students have travelled to places like Washington D.C. and New York City, where they have participated in clinics with faculty at Juilliard and the University of Maryland, seen the Emerson Quartet perform at the Lincoln Center, and played spaces ranging from the Union Station lobby to historic St. John's Cathedral – just to name a few highlights. Another focus has been on getting every student possible on the bus for these trips with a reasonable amount of fundraising. She has worked with the orchestra booster club, "Friends of GHS Orchestra," to take these trips every other year instead of every year.

Other highlights of her program have been bringing high quality musicians into the school to work with students – Dmitri Sitkovetsky (through the efforts of Dr. Kelly Burke) has conducted a workshop during her tenure, as has the East Carolina School of Music faculty, and most recently, John McLaughlin Williams, former Grimsley music student, Grammy-award winning conductor and celebrated violinist. Other residents of note are the

UNCG string faculty, as well as the UNC Charlotte Orchestra.

Ms. Green also encourages her students to participate in All-County orchestra, to audition for All-State orchestra, and to test themselves against other musicians at the annual North Carolina Music Performance Adjudication, where the Grimsley orchestras receive Superior ratings regularly.

In the community, Grimsley Orchestra students frequently form quartets or small ensembles to participate in Grimsley fundraisers and activities, visit local elementary and middle schools, or even to "play for pay" at weddings or other private events.

Students who have come through The Grimsley orchestra program have excelled in many areas of music. From highly-prized admissions to Juilliard and to placement in North Carolina's competitive Schools of Music to playing fiddle with a professional acoustic quartet, students have taken their Grimsley music experience with them to create, teach, and perform.

For generations of students, the orchestra programs at Grimsley and Kiser will forever be encapsulated in one name: "Ms. Green."

MF: In your opinion, what are the greatest strengths of GHS?

KD: The greatest strengths of Grimsley High School are the people and the incredible school spirit that they generate. Whether alumni, current students, or faculty members, I'm always impressed by the spirit I see both at school events and in Greensboro. While wearing Whirlie wear in other states, I have been stopped by proud alumni who proclaimed, "Whirlie Pride!"

MF: In your opinion, what are the greatest challenges for Grimsley High School as we move towards 2015 and beyond?

KD: As Grimsley moves forward we need to find a balance between our traditions while making sure we meet the needs of a changing student body. We need to work on integrating more technology for all of our students and making our classrooms a perfect hybrid of history and modern access to educational tools.

MF: As NC Teacher of the Year... has your perspective about education in NC changed?

KD: My perspective about public education has not changed this year, but it has been reinforced. After traveling and working with educators and students in 75 out of the 100 counties this year, I am more convinced than ever that our public schools are not broken. We always needs to think about ways to improve our schools, but for the most part we are doing an excellent job meeting the needs of an increasingly diverse student body of 1.5 million students in NC. I am so proud of all that our educators are doing.

MF: Any advice for GHS Alumni Class of 2014 and years past?

KD: Gabriel Garcia Marquez once claimed, "It is not true that people stop pursing dreams because they grow old; they grow old because they stop pursuing dreams." I encourage all alumni to continue dreaming and to continue seeking. Seek to improve yourself daily; seek to help others; seek to find solutions to problems; seek to find what makes you happy; and seek ways to make a difference. Be comfortable, but do not be complacent. If you do these things, then you will live a life that is rewarding, fulfilling, and full of possibilities.

Named in honor of Dr. Richard Andringa in 2009. Dr Andringa, a Greensboro physician trained in Pediatrics and Anesthesiology and a Grimsley parent, had six children graduate from GHS (four daughters and two sons) and was co-founder and first president of the GHS Alumni Association.



The Class of 1956 of Greensboro Senior High School gave this scholarship to the school as a gift to mark the 50th anniversary of their graduation from GHS and was first presented in 2006. The recipient must be a good citizen, have exhibited leadership at school or in the community, and have taken honors, AP or IB classes.



Megan Brannigan Lee Guard Memorial Scholarship \$1000
Created in 2008 by Grimsley student Will Curtis '09, this scholarship is given to a male and female senior who participated in school athletics. Criteria include GPA, character, sportsmanship, being a team player, leadership in extracurricular activities and community service. Lee Guard, a man of unquestioned character and a higheart, was a long-time member of the community and the owner of

Lee Guard, a man of unquestioned character and a big heart, was a long-time member of the community and the owner of Farmer Electric Sales. He grew to love Grimsley through his four children who attended GHS. He died in his late 50's of a heart attack on Thanksgiving Day in 2007.





Lester Gross was a member of the Class of 1976 whose passionate and energetic school spirit for Grimsley was well known and appreciated. While a student at GHS, this Whirlie served on the Pep Board, participated in intramual sports, was a member of the Grimsley soccer team, and was a varsity cheerleader for two years. After his death in his late 40's, a number of his friends, led by Bob Nadler, decided to create a scholarship in his memory. This scholarship is award to a student who is involved with music and athletics and is passionate in demonstrating his or her school spirit towards Grimsley. It was first awarded in 2005.



First presented in 2005, the Melvin G. Coleman Memorial Scholarship was created by Mr. Coleman's family: his daughter Dr. Margaret Coleman Szott '88 and her husband Mr. Tom Szott, and Mr. Coleman's widow, Mrs. Marie Essa Coleman '50 who taught typing and business classes at Grimsley for almost 20 years. Mr. Coleman was a sales rep at Gate City Motors for 31 years who was dedicated to his family and his career. The scholarship is awarded to a senior who exemplifies the ideal of the "scholar-athlete", with a high GPA from a challenging curriculm that preferably includes honors, AP and/or IB courses and who participated in one or more of the varsity teams of Cross Country, Swimming or Track and demonstrates dedication and team spirit.
